



ACCESS TO RCA



DOES THE HEALTH AND SAFETY AT WORK ACT APPLY TO RCA?

Under criminal law, the *Health and Safety at Work Act* only applies to employers, employees and the self-employed. Rochdale Company of Archers Limited (RCA) is a Community Amateur Sports Club (CASC) and the club is run entirely by volunteers, therefore the *HSAW Act* does not apply.

Under civil law the act also imposes a duty of care towards the **public** and **volunteers** therefore all members of RCA have a **duty of care** to anyone affected by their actions or inactions.

SCOPE

Club practice sessions run throughout the indoor and outdoor seasons with all senior members having 24-7 access to indoor and outdoor facilities.

RCA run the following activities: Have-a-Go Sessions, Taster Sessions, Beginners' Courses, Development Coaching Sessions, and dedicated junior coaching sessions.

Bow styles permitted at RCA include Recurve (barebow and freestyle), Compound (both limited and unlimited), Longbow and Flatbow variations. Crossbows are not permitted.

This risk assessment and associated control measures are restricted to archery activities at RCA at the Moorgate Avenue range only. Any variation from the above scope will require a separate risk assessment.

RISK LEVEL ASSESSORS

The following risk level matrix may be used to quantify the level of risk by a specific hazard.

Foreseeable risks must be rated by their likelihood of occurrence and their potential to cause harm, and both are rated 1-5. The product of these two values gives the level of risk.

It is understood and accepted that no activity can be completely free of risk.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE FIELD CAPTAIN

All indoor and outdoor shoots will be supervised by a Field Captain. The Field Captain is responsible for the safe running of the shoot and will ensure that they are familiar with, and that the shoot complies in all respects with, the current RCA Risk Assessment.

A Field Captain is akin to a judge at an away competition, or a referee in football, and on the day has ultimate decision making capability.

It is the Field Captain's responsibility to:

- 1. Make sure the field party set up the field in accordance with AGB guidelines.
- 2. Make any decision on safety due to high wind or inclement weather.
- 3. Make sure the shooting is safe.
- 4. Ensure the field runs to whistles or voice commands.
- 5. Ensure the shoot runs to the timings of a maximum of 4 minutes for one archer to shoot 6 arrows, or 2 minutes for 3 arrows.
- 6. Answer any questions regarding shooting on the day.
- 7. Make decisions on target allocations and round to be shot.
- 8. Manage shoot stoppage for equipment failure. The Field Captain can decide to pause the shoot temporarily or, more likely, let the person catch up the missing arrows either all at once or in parts. For avoidance of doubt, equipment failure does not include the re-gluing of fletchings or nocks an archer should always have spare arrows. If you do not have enough, you cannot make the shots up later, they are lost shots.
- 9. Manage bouncers. If there is a bouncer, then:
 - Imperial round announce to the Field Captain after you have shot the remainder of your arrows, and then let them know the number of the extra arrow you are shooting, and the Field Captain will approach the boss with you after everyone has shot, to check it was a bouncer or pass through.
 - Metric round with marking of targets, stop shooting straight away, as with everyone else on your boss, and attract the Field Captain. After the remainder of the field has shot, you will approach the target with the Field Captain and try to find the unmarked hole. If no unmarked hole found, an extra arrow may be shot at discretion of Field Captain.
- 10. Manage hangers. If an arrow does not penetrate into the boss and instead hangs from the target face, then the archer must call a "hanger" and the Field Captain must stop the shoot and the arrow will be treated as a bouncer, see above.
- 11. Judge scoring disputes or errors.

The Field Captain's decision on the day is final.

Any dispute with the Field Captain should not be taken up with the Field Captain, their decision is final. Your concerns should be addressed to the Chairman and will be considered by the Committee.



PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT

From the Archery GB, Rules of Shooting, Proc-01-13, section 307, Dress Regulations, the following dress codes apply:

- (b) Footwear that fully encloses the toes and front of the foot must be worn at all times when shooting.
- (c) (i) Tops or shirts must cover the front and back of the body (including the midriff when at full draw), they must not be strapless and, for gentlemen, must include sleeves.

The following PPE is provided by RCA to all participants on the Have-a-Go Session, Taster Session or Beginners' Courses:

- Chest Guard
- Armguard (Bracer)
- Finger Tab

RCA coaches and volunteers are responsible for distributing the above PPE to all beginners and demonstrating their use.

All new archers are encouraged to purchase the PPE listed above.

COACHING AT RCA

All coaching at RCA will be coordinated by the Coaching Coordinator and will be provided by volunteer coaches and senior archers. Junior archers may assist at Beginners Courses provided they are under the supervision of a senior archer/coach. Junior archers may not lead a coaching session.

TRAINING & QUALIFICATIONS

RCA Coaching Group will review and maintain training standards to ensure that an appropriate coach/participant ratio can be provided on the Have-a-Go Session, Taster Session or Beginners Courses.

RCA Committee and Coaches recognise the following training/qualifications held by the coaches:

- AGB Session (Level 1) Coaching
- AGB Development (Level 2) Coaching
- WA Level 2 Coaching
- Emergency First Aid
- First Aid at Work
- Automated External Defibrillator (AED)

Future training/qualification goals include:

- Increase number of AGB Session Coaches
- Increase number of AGB Development Coaches
- Introduce AGB County Coaches
- All Coaches to receive/maintain Emergency First Aid training

The Safeguarding Officer will assess whether the accident should be reported to Archery GB.

All incidents/accidents will be investigated by the Committee and recorded in the Meeting Minutes.
