TASK

- Removing self-seeded trees (small diameter < 3") and low-level bushes, shrubs and grasses that have overgrown within the compound.
- Burning vegetation that has been cut back.

SCOPE

This Risk Assessment relates to removing low-level vegetation accessible at ground level only using gardening tools. Working at height or tree felling does not form part of this Risk Assessment. Do not attempt to carry out work at height or tree felling. If required specialist contractors will be employed.

Paul Aspinall, who has prior knowledge and experience, will operate a small petrol chainsaw for chopping branches into manageable pieces.

FIRE PRECAUTION

Sparks/cinders from any fire may cause puncture damage to the black plastic wrapping of the straw bales within the compound. RCA will be liable for any damage caused to the property belonging to the local farmer, Alistair Rowley. Use all necessary precautions to prevent damage to the bales.



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DOES THE HEALTH AND SAFETY AT WORK ACT APPLY TO RCA?

Under criminal law, the Health and Safety at Work Act only applies to employers, employees and the self-employed. Rochdale Company of Archers Limited (RCA) is a Community Amateur Sports Club (CASC) and the club is run entirely by volunteers, therefore the HSAW Act does not apply.

Under civil law the act imposes a duty of care towards the public and volunteers therefore all members of RCA have a **duty of care** to anyone affected by their actions or inactions.

RISK LEVEL ASSESSORS

The following risk level matrix may be used to quantify the level of risk by a specific hazard.

Foreseeable risks must be rated by their likelihood of occurrence and their potential to cause harm, and both are rated 1-5. The product of these two values gives the level of risk.

It is understood and accepted that no activity can be completely free of risk.

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TOILETS

TOOLS

The vegetation removal is equivalent to gardening. Hand and battery powered garden tools will be used. Tools will not be provided by RCA. Please use your own tools which you are familiar with.

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Paul Aspinall, who has prior knowledge and experience, will operate a small petrol chainsaw for chopping branches into manageable pieces.

Tree felling is not permitted. We are prevented from felling the trees on the periphery of the compound until we have planning consent. If required, and when appropriate, tree felling will be carried out by a qualified and insured arborist.

PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT

- Wear strong work boots or wellingtons.
- Wear gloves suitable for the task:
 - Lightweight gloves for small tasks requiring maximum dexterity.
 - Heavyweight gloves for protection from thorns.
- Wear overalls or old clothing.
- When working near Paul operating the petrol chainsaw, wear eye and ear protection, and gloves.
